Ending Homelessness through ACIS

Housing is essential to improving the health of our most vulnerable neighbors.

Thanks to a unique Medicaid Waiver opportunity entitled Assistance in Community Integration Services (ACIS), we're in the middle of an exciting public/private partnership at the intersection of housing and health. The City of Baltimore, Health Care for the Homeless, and every hospital in Baltimore are implementing a pilot program to deliver the supportive services necessary to provide 200 housing opportunities for vulnerable individuals and families experiencing homelessness.

Ten hospitals committed \$2M to the partnership:

Jennifer has two words—Thank You

Jennifer has a master's degree in counseling and was working on her doctorate. She never expected to be homeless. After losing her job and suffering a stroke that affected her short-term memory, Jennifer landed in a Baltimore shelter. "It's frightening when you're thrown into the middle of nowhere and you don't

know a soul," Jennifer said. "I understood I was in danger." Just when she started to lose hope, Jennifer came to Health Care for the Homeless and met Justine, a Community Health Worker. Justine helped Jennifer get medical care and apply for housing. Thanks to ACIS, Jennifer moved into her very own one-bedroom apartment in 2018.

Jennifer loves her new home—and her support system even more. "I'm vulnerable not only because of my age and gender, but I'm alone and don't know what to do," Jennifer said. "Having Justine help me get to my health appointments now is really meaningful. I no longer struggle to figure out the bus schedule and where streets are."

Turning to Justine, she added, "Thank you so much for what you do for me."

Support Every Step of the Way

Health Care for the Homeless takes clients through every step of the supportive housing process. Case managers help clients apply for housing through the Baltimore City Office of Homeless Services Coordinated Access System. Benefits specialists help clients secure income to pay for housing when applicable. Supportive Housing staff help clients locate and move into housing, provide transportation to appointments and grocery stores, help pay bills and work with landlords. Development team members raise private funds for move-in kits for newly housed clients.


