# Homelessness is on the rise...

18% increase in homelessness nationally, with families seeing the largest jump

**77%** more older adults experiencing homelessness

**2X** as many Baltimoreans needed emergency shelter in the last two years

\$1,575 average rent for a one-bedroom apartment in Baltimore

**41%** of Health Care for the Homeless clients rely on Medicaid. 12% have Medicare, 1% private insurance, and 46% are uninsured.

## ...and we are listening to clients and stepping up

In 2024, Health Care for the Homeless focused on the services clients want most inside our clinics and met more people where they are in the community.

**11,644** adults and families turned to Health Care for the Homeless (6% increase)

**2.5X** more mobile clinic visits

**2X** more dental visits

**428** medical visits inside local emergency shelters



I'm trying to keep stability. I have an occupational therapist here, he's helped me set up a routine—that's just basic life skills: wash my face, brush my hair, change clothes, and I want to go back to school. It's hard, it's stressful. But I want to fight the battle. I come and get my shot here every month. I don't know if I'm managing my mental health—I'd have to get a manager involved for that. [laughs] Just dealing with it and coping with it how I can, that's enough."—Marian



I have a partner who is HIV positive and I'm not. At first, I was a little hesitant because I thought [PrEP] was for people who were already positive. But my doctor at Health Care for the Homeless explained more about how it worked and said it would be a good option. I tell everyone: it's made me feel safer." – Dominic Reid



The VA doesn't provide dental care unless you're on full disability.

The clinic here took care of me, though, and now I show up when they need volunteers—the Coat Drive, the race at Patterson Park. I wrote a poem to read at the Homeless Persons' Memorial Day service."

## Housing ends homelessness

Through **1,064** visits, Case Managers worked with **433** people to directly apply for housing, get security deposits, and use section 8 youchers.

Housing Services staff helped **867** people get and keep housing.

#### We advocated to pass:



**\$10** million for eviction prevention through community schools



Rights to safe, habitable homes for renters



**\$5.4 million** for statewide expansion of the Medicaid supportive housing waiver (ACIS)




## More housing is on the way


